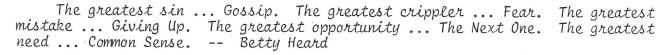

Pilot of the crew that bailed out over the Celebes just after I was shipped out. He too was not flying with his crew. He wore his old khaki uniform, hat and all. It fit and he looked so young in it I wondered what he was doing at this old man's reunion. He brought a lot of memorabilia and told me how my friend Bill Greenburg had survived and others were machine gunned by the Japanese after being betrayed by the natives. The last of the story is that the Dutch ordered the natives out of their village and destroyed it.

Earl Johnson

He was in the 371st Squadron. He was the first Bombardier of my class at Demming that I'd seen since Morotai. We're going to exchange logs of our missions to see what we might have experienced in common. He had eight crew members there.

TO TUFFY, MY DOG -- 1944-1945

Noemfoor and Morotai must have been typical of the rest of the South Pacific islands. You had little use for money. Unless you gambled or sent it home there wasn't any need to draw pay each month. So it accumulated. When the rest leave finally came around and you were on your way back to Bondi Beach or some other fabled place in the Sydney area you drew all your back pay and set out for the time of your life. After three weeks of the good life tomorrow became the day you returned to reality. I wasn't ready to go. I'm a kid in a candy store and my money isn't all gone yet. I bought my mother an Irish Belleek mustache cup and saucer, a fur Koala bear for a girl friend, and two cases of Scotch whiskey that fit nicely in the B-4 bag with a few other things to keep them from rattling. My buddies borrowed a hundred pounds (over \$300 as I remember). Then there was a last minute thought. Why not take a puppy back to Morotai. It never entered my mind that there might be a reason not to. I took the tram (this was another combat experience) to the "key" where the ferry boats came and went. This is right where they built the world famous opera house. It may have been Sunday as the shop was closed when I got there. I hadn't come all the way across Sydney to be disappointed. Next door was a bar and club for European Sailors. I wasn't too sure whether they liked American officers or not. It turned out that they were very helpful. They told me to knock hard that the owner of the pet store lived upstairs and that he would open up. Tuffy was my choice of five dalmations. The last of my money was well spent.

The next day we were winging our way back to the war. After several hours of flying the C-47 was coming down for a landing. I was looking forward to the heat I expected in Biak or Holandia. I had wrapped Tuffy in my leather flying jacket and it was cool. We had only gotten as far as Brisbane. They had returned for repairs. With the hastle to a pup and a very heavy B-4 bag I left the flight jacket in the plane and wasn't able to recover it. The realities of parenthood....I'm flat broke and have a puppy to entertain.

Once back in the squadron area I had to start thinking about feeding my friend. It was surprisingly easy. There was a supply of canned salmon and I was free to take a can a day. The dog was eating better than I was. All that fish produced a nice shiney coat.

It was easy to have a dog. Everyone seemed to enjoy him. It wasn't necessary to tie him up. When I flew he just waited around the area until I returned. Almost every day we would swim in the ocean then take a shower where they were conveniently located by the shore.

With the same disregard of what anyone might think of my having the dog in the first place, I didn't ask anyone what they thought of my taking him on a combat mission. It should have been easy, but ... the taxi ways were narrow and when the plane ahead of us had a flat tire we tried taxiing around it. There wasn't quite enough room. Our right wheel slipped off the taxi way leaving the plane unable to get back up there. There we

were the eleven of us and as the directive said, "the crew will remain with the plane until the ground crews have resolved the problem". This was one area where Tuffy wouldn't be running loose. Several hours later we got our ride back to the area. Tuffy never flew a mission.



It it hadn't been for Tuffy I would never have had the adventure of driving an Army jeep. The day I took him to the veterinarian to cure his worms that muddy path to the air strip was slicker than usual. At one point the road was a narrow levee with a deep pond on each side and half submerged vehicles still where they went in. You may be as surprised as I was then to learn that the Army had veterinarians. It wasn't because they anticipated guys like me having a sick dog. Do you know why they had them? Give up? It was to inspect the meat we ate. How would you like to have had that job. I wouldn't try to tell your their inspections produced good meat, but curing worms was something they could do.

As the missions built up and it was getting closer to the time I'd be going back to the States, my Dad in Bakersfield was building a fenced area behind the house. This was just another thing I knew would work out. No one was saying it couldn't be done, but I wasn't asking too many questions either. I figured that Tuffy and I were going home. Then the unexpected happened.

I was hit on my thirty-eight mission and was to be sent home aboard ship in a hospital ward. I got to see Tuffy a couple of times when the guys would come down to the emergency hospital. I was never to see him again. He was a good dog. John Starr loved that dog as I did and made every effort to get him to California. They got as far as Manila where Tuffy was hit and killed by a vehicle. By now I'm dealing more with realities than I was as the youngster that bought that dog. John wrote and told me what had happened. What I didn't learn until a recent reunion was that he was so attached to that black and white pup that he got himself one. As he told me, there was something that neither of us knew forty years ago, and that was just how big a dalmation can get.

Tuffy wasn't the only pet in the area, but I'm sure he was the best. There was a monkey that bit; there was a parrot that wouldn't talk but made a lot of noise; there was a jungle-born dog that drank too much booze. Someone even had a goat. From what I hear about goats he probably wasn't too neat either. There have been some special dogs since then, but with reunions, old friends, and old memories Tuffy lives on.

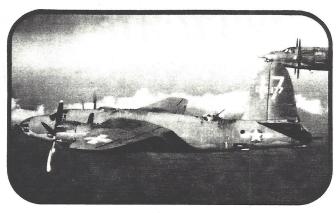

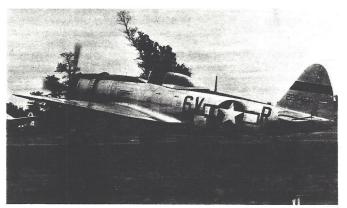

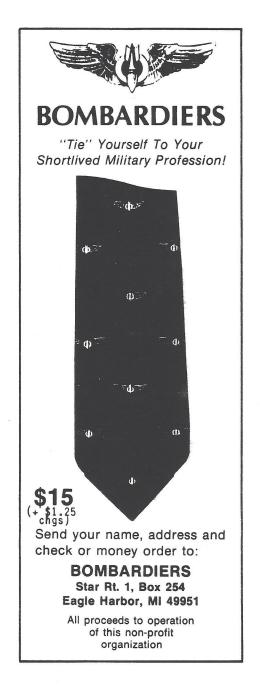

In either case we are pleased to have the opportunity to make contact with you and provide you some information about this organization. We hope you will at least complete and return the enclosed bio sketch form!

Our first reunion was held at the Hilton Hotel in Midland, TX, 11-14 April 1985. We had a total of 367 attend, and approximately 250 of these were bombardiers. At the first gathering, the undersigned was named to head BOMBARDIERS, Inc., as Chairman of the Board and Executive Director. Other directors of the 7-man board are: Joel H. A second reunion is already scheduled and work has begun to make it an even better gathering than our first. The site will be The Riverwalk Marriott Hotel in San Antonio--The dates: 26 through 29 March 1987. While the subject is fresh on your mind, won't you mark your calendar for this event? You won't be sorry, if the success of the first reunion is any criteria!

Dayton, Ohio was selected as the site of our third reunion. The **Stouffer Hotel**, will be headquarters for the 18 through 21 April 1989 gathering.

Negotiations are currently underway with the USAF ARMAMENT MUSEUM at Eglin AFB, Florida, to give us permanent display space in their Class B facility. Except for the museum at Wright-Patterson and possibly another place, all other museums in the Air Force as Class C. We feel very fortunate to be this far along in planning for possible inclusion in the ARMAMENT MUSUEM--What could be more appropriate? Bombardiers & Armament!

For this and obvious other reasons, we would like to ask you to consider emptying your old footlockers and boxes to donate to us every bit of WWII and Bombardiering memorabilia you can find. We are particularly in the market for class-books and copies of all orders relating to your class graduation. Once we get all information about numbers of graduates per class, we will be able to produce some detailed information about bombardiering history and background that we have thus far been unable to find anywhere in the US Air Force or the Army archives.

When you complete your bio-sketch form, be sure to include your bomb group and squadron in which you served. We include this information in the roster to help reunite buddies who flew combat together.
