

Making Contact With the 307th BG










War Stories, Great and Small





A typical response from our Historian, Jim McCabe

An inquiry was recently received by Member Services, from the "Contact Us" page on our website. Don Calarco responded briefly and forwarded it to Jim. It read:

Hello,

I am Gayle Ihde, Wm. Ihde's only granddaughter. I am ashamed to say this, but unfortunately during my younger years I had no interest in WWII history and knowing what exactly my Grandad did there for our country. He passed away a year ago in April. So, now I will never hear his story. From the tiny tidbits I could find of him it points to the 307th Bomb Group. I have asked my dad and he is pretty sure my grandad flew in B-24's. One thing my dad did remember is that his plane had to make an emergency crash landing on one of their missions. My mother recently told me someone was writing a book about a mission or something he was in but the names were being changed and she didn't know anything about it either.

I found a letter on fold3 written by Charles Dowdy referencing my grandad as a navigator and that he had caught a bad case of malaria and they had to take him to Port Moseby then to Nadzab.

If you have any information or could lead me in the right direction, I would be so grateful.

Jim's Response

Dear Gayle,

It is great to hear from you. First and foremost, it is essential that you free yourself of any guilt pertaining to your lack of knowledge regarding your grandfather's service. Of the thousands of men who would serve in the 307th BG, not a one has fully discussed their experiences. There are about a dozen books which will give you much information and insights but I have learned that even these resources have omitted the horrors faced by the 307th BG. In so doing, the authors protected themselves, the men with whom they served, and each of us. The only reason you do not know more about your grandfather's service is because he did not want you to know. Had you somehow pursued this endeavor while he was still with us, it is most unlikely he would have shared much if anything. I can assure you he would not have wanted for you to create the images in you mind of the horrors he experienced. I am pleased to know my father stood by his side in their Navigator Mission Briefings and that my father and Don's father, flew with him. I am proud of you for somehow knowing your grandfather's distinguished service should be brought to light.

Like my father, 2nd Lt. Michael J. McCabe, your grandfather, Lt. William M. Ihde, was a Navigator in the 307th Bombardment Group, 424th Bombardment Squadron. My father, Don Calarco's father, S/Sgt. Dominic Calarco, 424th BS Nose Gunner, and your grandfather flew many missions together. It will be my pleasure to inform you of his distinguished service to our country. I have contacted your father's pilot, A. J. Evans, to confirm if he is still with us and to see if he is well enough to speak with you. I have also contacted Alan "Smokey" Guild, another 424th BS pilot who was in the skies with your grandfather on 441119. On this date, your grandfather's B-24 Bomber was with the 424th BS on a combat mission to the Alicante Airdrome(Japanese Airbase) in the Philippine Islands. They were hit by 20 mm canon fire by one or some of the dozen Japanese fighters that attacked them for over thirty minutes. Two of your grandfather's crew members were wounded. Your grandfather's friend and Bombardier, Lt. Curtiss W. Finney, from DeKalb County, IL, was severely wounded in his right leg.

Jim's Response (continued)

Your grandfather tended to him for hours, administered blood plasma and according to our records rendered, "all possible assistance". Regrettably, Lt. Finney would die from his wounds with his friend, your grandfather, by his side, an hour before they reached their base at Morotai.

I have a photo of your grandfather's crew. Let me know if you need a copy. What information do you have? If you are interested in further information on your grandfather's military service with the Long Ranger's, to start, I would recommend you secure copies of both Up The Slot by Samuel I Walker, and The Long Rangers A Diary of the 307th Bombardment Group (H), by Sam Britt. Both of these are available at our websites PX at our cost plus S&H: http://www.shop.307bg.net/

If you join our Assoc. I will research our records and provide you with any Mission Plans, Mission Reports, Crew Loading Lists, Photos and Combat Videos available. If you have not already done so, read Unbroken, by Laura Hillenbrand. The movie came out Xmas Day. Louie Zamperini was one of our Bombardiers. http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=XrjJbl7kRrl

Your grandfather enlisted one year plus one day after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. Here is his enlistment record:

Start a file with the above. Having his ASN (Army Serial Number) is essential to additional searching. Please inform me of any additional information you, or potentially other family members may have like: photos, letters home, insignia on his uniform/bomber jacket, etc. Push hard on this. It is common that someone in the family has a box somewhere and that they have had it so long, even they don't remember.

Jim's Response (continued)

Write these folks and request your grandfather's military records and replacement medals. They will re-issue you his original medals for free: http://www.archives.gov/st-louis/military-personnel/index.html

Register your grandfather's at this site and he will be forever memorialized at the WWII Memorial in Washington DC. Have you been to it? http://www.wwiimemorial.com/

I hope you will consider joining us at our next reunion this coming Sept. in New Orleans. I know you would never regret meeting some of the veterans who flew missions with your grandfather. Call me if you'd like.


