

John Vanderpoel's WWII memories ...

"John Vanderpoel said "I thought I was going to die many times — I could see the enemy pilot's face when they would fly right through our formation of airplanes."

As you know John was commander of the 424th Bomb Squadron when Greg Babinski's father was with the Long Rangers. Thanks Greg for the article.

The following article comes from interviews with residents at the Concord Deaconess and has been put into a book titled "Memories of World War II."

I was in the reserves in the ROTC at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. When I went to flying school, I was a good student and was larger than average. The larger guys were sent to two engine school. After that I was put into an instructor role in pilot school, where we taught guys who had their wings but needed more. Early in 1941, I was called to active duty. I trained people in flying over water, night flying, bombing and navigation, and I was only 23 years old. They gave a lot of responsibility to us as very young men. Albany, Ga., Smyrna, Texas and El Paso were some of my stations until May 1944 when I was shipped to Guadalcanal. Even though I was a squadron commander of 750 men, the brass above me kept putting me into instruction when I wanted to go to war. Because I had taught, I knew how to deal with emergencies. We always had rotten gas and engines to train people on (because they needed the good materials for the fighting forces) and I had dealt with 60 or 70 engines failing. Finally I started flying bombing runs out of the Admiralty Islands as we worked our way to the Philippines.

We lived under palm trees and the monkeys would throw coconuts at us. Conditions were pretty primitive in our tents. We had a beautiful landing strip surrounded by coral reefs, but it was narrow with strong winds. In the evening at 6:15 p.m. a movie would start, and last maybe until 8:15 p.m. We always took our helmets to the movies because at the end, the Japanese would flyover with their engines off, trying to beat radar and bomb us. We lost three planes one night, when a Japanese bomb hit an airplane already loaded with bombs for the morning run. It exploded and took out two other planes, including my favorite B-24.

I had to write 93 letters to mothers of killed pilots, though we did not have many losses in my immediate group. I thought I was going to die many times — I could see the enemy pilot's face when they would fly right through our formation of airplanes. We had no fighter plane escorts. Except one time, Charles Lindberg escorted us in flight. He was selling airplanes, but was the best gas conserver of all time. He taught people how to fine tune and run their engines. He shot down a Japanese plane on that trip.

When you flew with no fighter escort and the enemy flew right into your formation, you'd come home with engines out, bullet holes through the plane, people hurt, guys screaming from fright.

My plane was the first over Palau, a big island east of the Philippines. We were a reconnaissance flight sent to take pictures of targets before the Navy started the invasion. They told me to go in at 22,000 feet. But when I got there, I could not see anything because of the clouds. We had to come down to 9,000 feet before we came out of the clouds. Japanese Zeros came right up after us while I was taking the reconnaissance photos. We kept spiraling up to hide in the clouds. We left lots of pilots under the water there in that campaign. Tokyo Rose came on the radio later and said that the lone B-24 that came over in the afternoon had crashed. But it wasn't true - we all laughed. We used to listen to her show just for the music. One night at the movies, all of a sudden the microphone came on and announced my wife had given birth to our second son. We had been married in September 1941 and we had our first child. Eric, the following August, I figured I had enough experience that I would live through the war, so we wanted another child - the child whose birth was announced over the microphone on our island base. I came home in July 1945 on a boat with no escort and few guns when the USS Indianapolis was sunk on the way back from delivering the atomic bombs to the Enola Gay. If it had been sunk on the way over, the bombs would have been lost. Anyway, we spent 30 days zigzagging on the water to dodge Japanese submarines. The war did not really change me - it made me older. I had so many blessings. A few days ago, I got news that one of my flying school buddies had died and it brought tears to my eyes. We had the best squadron — when people needed help, they always stole from my group.

Milton C. Potee, 92 years old, of Rogers, Arkansas, took his final flight surrounded by his family on April 12, 2018 in his home.

Milt served as a T/Sgt., Tailgunner, on the Lt. Elvin D. Reamy Crew, 370th Bombardment Squadron, from 1944-45. We offer our condolences to his wife Vivian and their families. Milt was a regular 307th BG Association Reunion attendee. He was ever humble. It was only as Historian that I learned Milt had flown combat missions to Yap, Koror, Balikpapan and the Philippines. The 307th BG's losses during this period were staggering. The losses inflicted on the Japanese would prove

vital to victory in the SW Pacific. Following the devastating combat mission to Balikpapan on 441003, only one 307th BG crew returned to their base at Noemfoor. The remaining B-24 Bombers that survived had scattered all over the SW Pacific with their casualties and wounded aboard. Only five were put back in service with most of the aircraft having 400-600 holes in them. The 370th BS lost 3 crews over the target, Lt.'s Wright's, Kendall's and Gage's, 31 men in all. Collectively the 307th BG's 4 squadrons lost over 60 men. Milt would have known many of these men, many were friends.

The 307th BG would not fly another combat mission until 441010 as they awaited replacement crews and new aircraft. Milt and the Reamy Crew would fly this combat mission back to Balikpapan. Combined with the 440930 and 441003 combat missions to Balikpapan, the crews would reap some satisfaction in delivering what was considered to be the fatal blow to the Japanese oil installations at Balikpapan. The 307th BG would earn their second PUC (Presidential Unit Citation), the equivalent of a Distinguished Flying Cross for every crew member for the 1st of these missions.

If you are a descendant of Milt Potee or any other 307th BG crew member who served during this period, you are blessed to have been born. My father was among the replacement crews for the men lost and wounded. I grew up learning what these men and their ground crew personnel had endured and accomplished. I know in my heart that if not for their determination and professionalism, I and my extended family (now 29 in this bloodline and counting), would likely never have been. Mr. McFarland had met Dale at a Best Buy in Jacksonville when they struck up a conversation. If anyone knows Dale, you know he loves to talk. Mr. McFarland said he would love to have him speak to his classes, so they could meet a true WWII hero. Mr. Calvin McFarland teaches Social Studies & a class on the Holocaust & WWII at Mandarin High School in Jacksonville, FL.

It was arranged for Dale to speak on March 14 to 3 classes & 15th to 2 classes about his life and service. In between classes on the 15th Dale & his daughter, Debbie Drake, were blessed to have a 2-hour break during which they had an amazing conversation with Mr. Calvin.

Dale told of his service from when he entered until he was discharged. He spoke of life overseas and the 3 main missions that he was involved in.

One was when they were flying formation to hunt down a crippled ship and accidently came across a Japanese Task Force with the battleship Yamato.

The second was when the bombs hung up and the tails where spinning off. He and the bombardier had to throw them out by hand.

And third was the 17th hour flight to get to Borneo so they could bomb the refinery.

He also passed around some artifacts he has including a 50 cal. Bullet and a piece from a Japanese airplane.

After that he spoke of life during the 40s and showed them menus from restaurants & a war ration book.

After that he took questions from the students. They had some interest in what it was like during the depression and after. Also, about women's role during the war and what his thoughts were of the events of today.

When it was close to the bell, he would pose for pictures with the students and shake their hand. It was an amazing and gratifying time for all involved.




January 12, 2018
