REUNION UPDATE:


Plans are gradually taking shape for our 2002 Reunion in Salt Lake City. Since the Wyndham Hotel is one block from Temple Square, ZCMI Center, Crossroads Plaza, Union Pacific Depot Museum, and the Gateway Plaza, we are scheduling no tours in these areas. I could see no reason to set up tours at a cost to you when each of these sites are so close to the Hotel and can be visited on your own time and at no cost. The Crossroads Plaza and Gateway Plaza have theatres, restaurants, and shops available.

Tours currently being checked out are: Great Salt Lake, the Bingham Mine (2nd largest open pit mine in the world), and Thanksgiving Point (similar to the Bouchard Gardens in Victoria, Canada). A second tour is planned to visit Hill Field and the Air Force Museum with a drive over the causeway across Great Salt Lake to Antelope Island, Each of these tours would include lunch, either on your own or catered. When I mentioned to them that I am working on writing a book on the young men of my father's generation that went off to WWII from the same Greek Church community in NYC, Mrs. George said that she lost her only brother during the war.
