71st VJ Day Anniversary

Annual Reunion of the 307th Bombardment Group(H), 13th Air Force, US Army Air Corps Nashville, Tennessee, USA August 10 - 14, 2016



On behalf of the Filipino nation and the Filipino Veterans Community, I congratulate the veterans of the 307th Bombardment Group (H) Association of the 13th Air Force of the United States Army Air Corps as it celebrates its Annual Reunion and the 71st Anniversary of VJ Day!

This occasion is made doubly meaningful by the presence of your brother's-inarms, children, grand-children, great grand-children, friends and loved ones.

Having served in the Philippine Embassy in Washington DC for 14 years mostly as the Veterans Attaché dealing with the issues of Filipino WW2 veterans, I am familiar with the exploits of the GIs in the Philippines including the "Long Rangers". I also attended many reunions of the US WW2 veterans who served in the Philippines.

Consisting of the 370th, 371st, 372nd, and 424th Squadrons, the Long Rangers completed 625 Missions in the Pacific Theater, participated in 11 campaigns and received two Distinguished Unit Citations – achievements that many Americans and Filipinos today do not know. But the story of 307th Bombardment Group in the Pacific Theater is not complete without mention of the participation of the Filipinos who rescued many of the bomber crews, tended to their medical needs and assisted them in evading Japanese capture at great perils to their lives. It is unfortunate that many who went down with their planes remain unaccounted to this day. Our hearts go to their relatives who continue to hope that they will be found. The Philippine government fully supports the efforts to locate them.

This year, 71 years after the War in the Pacific ended, the brotherhood and camaraderie of American and Filipino defenders remain strong, and the alliance of both nations remains iron-clad, currently jointly fighting modern wars: against terrorism, pandemic diseases, disasters and calamities and the adverse effects of climate change, among others. The US-Philippine relations forged under adversity continue to this day.

Again, congratulations on your reunion and may the blessings of the Almighty be with you all. Mabuhay!


## **A Well Deserved Recognition**


## One such individual is Stacy Flora Roth.... Our very own Rosie the Riveter!


