A Memorable Veteran Story

To The members of the 307th Bomb Group (H).

My name is Neal Siebenbruner, I was with the 7th Air Force, 11th Bomb Group (H). 431st BS, Pilots name Lt Don Meyer. Flew in he western and central Pacific. I want to telll you a litle bit about our group. My traveling days are over as well as the two older vets Doyle Ebel, Bud Jung who were at our last reunion at Shriver Air Force base in Colorado Springs Col. We ad a wonderful run of reunions but faded out as there were only 26 in attendance so w had to call it guits. We started out with 4 sqdns 26-42-98- and 431st. I was in the 431st. Our crew joined them at Kuajalein in the Marshals in 1944 and the transferred to Guam in late 44 and hit Iwo Jima and Japan. We started our reunions in 1960. Our Bombadier purchased a Teddy Bear which stood about 2 ft high. We received him at Tonopah, Nevada during our crew training. We named him Roger X111 and gave him the serial number of our plane we flew all our missions in. After our last mission we had a party in the offices tent and put all our names in a hat. My name was drawn and I have had the bear in my custody for 70 years. I took him along to the reunion in Rapid City, S.D. Col. Robert Rysvay (Retired)saw him and went back home to Colorado and told Col. Dan Bourque commander of the 26th Space aggressor Squadron(which was our old 26th BS). They decided they wanted to adopt Roger and history of th 11th BG. So I agreed and sent them Roger and the history. On June 4th They invited my wife and I to a ceremony to adopt roger legally. On June 6th they held the ceremony at Shriver Air Force Base. So that's why our last reunion was there just to see Roger again. Will send you pictures concerning the above. 

Jim Walsh



Judge Barnard F. Jennings Passed away peacefully at his home on September 24, 2016 at the age of 91. He leaves behind his beloved wife of 67 years, Nancy Lee; his daughter, Tricia Kincheloe and her husband John of Clifton, VA.; sister, Adelaide J. Smith and her husband Frisby of Wytheville, VA.; sister Evelyn J. Taylor of Baltimore, MD.; sister-in-law, Roberta H. Huntt of Wytheville, VA.; brother-in-law, A. Courtney Guild of Louisville, KY.; five nephews; one niece; and numerous great-nieces and nephews. Judge Jennings was born August 2, 1925 in Johnson City, TN. He grew up in Southwest Virginia, and graduated from Richlands High School in 1942. He worked for the Civilian Conservation Corps one summer during the Depression. He enrolled in Virginia Polytechnic Institute where he was a member of the undefeated freshman football squad. He left V. P. I. at the beginning of his junior year and enlisted in the Army Air Corps. He was a top turret gunner on a B-24 "Liberator" bomber as a member of the 13th Air Force, 424th Bombardment Squadron, 307th Bombardment Group and was stationed in Morotai in the Dutch East Indies. He flew 44 missions in the Pacific theater over the Bismarck Archipelago, China, the Philippines and New Guinea. He was awarded an Asiatic-Pacific Ribbon with 5 bronze stars, a Philippine Liberation Ribbon, an Air Medal with 3 clusters, a good conduct medal and clasp and an Overseas Bar. He was discharged in October, 1945 as a Staff Sergeant. Upon returning home, he enrolled at the University of Virginia, where he played football. He graduated in 1948 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Business. He graduated from George Washington University Law School in 1950. He was an Assistant Commonwealth Attorney for three years beginning in 1952 and then joined the law firm which eventually became Kelly, Jennings, Louk and Farley. He was appointed to fill a vacancy on the Fairfax Town Council and then elected to continue filling that seat. On April 1, 1964 he was recommended by the Fairfax County Bar and elected by the Virginia State Legislature to serve as a Circuit Court Judge.

Barney was appointed as Chief Circuit Court Judge of the 19th Judicial Circuit in 1975. He was instrumental in the planning, design and building of the Fairfax County Judicial Center. The building was dedicated on September 11, 1982 and named the Jennings Building in his honor. Judge Jennings retired from the bench on December 31, 1987, but continued to serve as a Substitute Judge and presided over cases throughout the state. He hoped to hear a case in every county in



Virginia. Even though he did not achieve this goal, he did try cases in the vast majority of the jurisdictions within Virginia. He was an early member of the Shillelagh's Travel Club, a member of the Country Club of Fairfax since the late 1950s, a Past President and a Paul Harris Fellow of the Fairfax Rotary Club, a member of the VFW Post #8469, the Fairfax Bar Association, Virginia State Bar, the American Bar Association and Fairfax United Methodist Church. At various times he served on the Board of Directors of the National Bank of Fairfax, George Mason Bank and the Virginia portion of United Bank. In his spare time he enjoyed working in his vegetable garden, traveling to foreign countries, flying small planes, riding his Harley-Davidson, spending evenings by the fireplace with family and friends and having a very dry martini. A visitation was held on Thursday, October 6, 2016 pm. at Demaine Funeral Home, 10565 Main Street, Fairfax, VA . 22030. Funeral Services were held on Friday, October 7, 2016 at 11 a.m. at the Fairfax United Methodist Church, 10300 Stratford Avenue, Fairfax, VA 22030 with interment at the Fairfax Cemetery.

Elvin Dale Reamey, Lt. Col., USAF, ret., aged 97, of Saratoga, CA passed away from natural causes on September 14, 2016. He was born in Tulsa, OK on June 29, 1919 to Nora Ethel Reamey, and Jesse Elmer Reamey. He is survived by his wife of 54 years, Lois Jean Reamey, of Saratoga, CA and his children Sally Wilcox of Eugene, OR, Barbara Tafe of Pompey, NY, Elvin Reamey of Ramona, CA and Susan Riley of Las Vegas, NV. He is also survived by his sister Ruby



Potter, and his brother Roy Reamey, both of Tulsa, OK. Elvin also has eight grand-children and numerous great and great-great grandchildren. Colonel Reamey was a 22 year United States Air Force veteran who served as a Command Pilot with the 307th Bomb Group during World War II in the South Pacific. He also did tours of duty in North Africa and Europe after the war. After retiring from the Air Force in 1960, he went on to engineering positions with Lockheed Missiles and Space Corporation in Sunnyvale, CA, Bechtel Corporation in San Francisco, CA, and Ralph M. Parsons Corporation in Pasadena, CA, with whom he worked for ten years in Saudi Arabia. After retirement from Parsons, Elvin returned home to Saratoga to spend a semi retired life, spending his time between working as a Security Supervisor for Applied Materials, Inc. and tearing up golf courses, and most likely fudging the score a bit, with his buddies. He was a beloved Husband, Father, Brother, Grandfather and friend to all who knew him. He will be greatly missed.


