Dec. 14 th 1945 Moratai Island Dear Mr. Di Santi; was unable to answer it promptly because I was trying to get as much information as possible. You also had the wrong address so it took longer than it should have, & get & me. In case you write again, it's 185th not 755 the Had you known that I was on this island, and written just one week sooner, I could have done all that you asked for . I was only 2 or 3 blocks away from the Moratae Cemetery and went there as soon as possible. I found out from the persons in charge that your nephew was buried here.

all the graves were dug up and shipped to Finochafen, Wew Guinea Down at Finochafen they are building a U.S. National Emetery for all the loop who were killed on this island and all the bases south of here. In this way it will be organized instead of having cemeteries on these small islands, which we intend to move out of.

I also asked about the plane crash and me sorry & say that everyone in it was killed instantly. The 307 the Bombardment Group moved out and is now up in Manila. I spoke & one of the Officers in it who was left behind and he couldn't recall this
